Love Is Not...(Part II)

[Love] is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. (1 Corinthians 13:5)

Last month we talked about the three different words that the Greek language has for love. It may be interesting to know that the one used in these verses seems to have been virtually a Christian invention -- a new word for a new thing. It draws its meaning directly from the revelation of God in Christ -- his loving attitude toward us and the resulting action that was taken because of that attitude. His is a love that is committed to loving us even though we are unlovable. It is a love not based on how we treat him, but on his commitment to be loving to us. That's the love being described in our words.

That love, of course, is not natural for us. It is born in us only when the Holy Spirit brings us to faith so that we might receive Christ's love in the forgiveness of sins he won for us at the cross. Having received that love, and with the Holy Spirit sitting on the throne of our hearts, we are empowered to show Christ-like love to all around us. Once again this month we see what that love will look like as we listen to Paul tell us what love is not.

Love is not self-seeking! It is not self-loving! It is not selfish! Selfishness lies at the root of so many of this world's problems -- problems between rich and poor, between

nation and nation, between a man and his neighbor, between husband and wife, between brother and sister. In fact, think of any sin and you will find selfishness at its root. No wonder love can not be self-seeking!

Instead, unselfish Christian love moves us to look beyond ourselves and to seek the welfare of others. It seeks to pattern our life after Christ, who willingly gave himself up for us so that we might be forgiven. It takes to heart these words of God: "Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 2:4,5).

Love is not easily angered! It doesn't look for the worst in what a person does. It understands that in this world we will always be dealing with sinners. For this reason, instead of being easily angered, love is willing to forgive. It is considerate. It takes the words and actions of others in the kindest possible way. Again, God's word instructs us: "Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:8).

Love keeps no record of wrongs! Have you ever asked - why do

people keep a record of wrongs? Isn't it so they can "destroy" someone and win an argument at a later date!? Isn't it so they can bear a grudge and take revenge!? But that's the furthest thing from the love God speaks of in these verses.

A love that keeps no record of wrongs demands no satisfaction; remembers one's own shortcomings; and remembers the forgiving spirit of our heavenly Father. A love that keeps no record of wrongs follows the example of God himself who covers every sin with the righteousness of Christ and who designed and carried out a plan for his justice to be taken out on our substitute Jesus instead of us.

So how has your love been lately? (Pause and think about it) See how again we must carry our sins in repentance to the cross of Jesus our Savior. And then, having done that, may we again praise God that in his love he doesn't keep a record of our wrongs, become easily angered, or display his love in a self-seeking manner. Instead, his love has always been committed to us. So committed, in fact, that he gave up his Son into death so that our sins of lovelessness might be washed away.

May 6 – Sixth Sunday of Easter

Focus – The Easter Effect: Lives that Reflect Christ's Love

Readings: Acts 9:36-42; 1 John 4:1-11; John 15:9-17

May 10 – Ascension Service

Focus – Falling within the Easter season as an important event in the life of Jesus is his ascension into heaven on the 40th day after his resurrection. The Festival of Ascension emphasizes the truth that Jesus is in control over everything for the good of his believers, and will certainly come back to take his believers to the heaven he has prepared for them. We have opportunity to celebrate Jesus' ascension with a worship service on May 10, at 6:30 p.m. in Black River Falls.

10 THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW (OR MIGHT NOT KNOW) ABOUT YOUR CHURCH

This short article continues a section begun in the newsletter at the beginning of the year. The goal of this section is to keep you as well informed as possible as to the whats, whys, and hows of your congregation.

5. Fundraising – why don't we do it as a congregation?

Have you ever asked that question? Perhaps you've visited other churches that have done it and wondered why we don't. While it is true that the Bible does not say, "you shall not have fundraisers," there are a number of biblical principles of stewardship that lead us to a decision about fundraising.

First of all, God wants our offerings and gifts to him to be given in response to His love for us in Christ: *"For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9)*. But when you think about fundraisers, do you see that as the attitude behind the giving? Or, do we see in the way fundraising is carried out that giving is actually done in order to receive something in return?

Secondly, God wants our offerings and gifts to come from a willing and cheerful heart: *"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7)*. Once again when you think about fundraising within the church, can we see how it may easily open the door for giving to be done reluctantly, guiltily, or even out of a feeling of duty?

Finally, with all this said, there is something we need to keep in mind. For us to have a special effort to raise funds for a special purpose is not wrong. In fact, we could say it is good practice. Just look at the Apostle Paul when he gathered money on his missionary journey – *"Now about the collection for God's people: Do what I told the Galatian churches to do" (2 Corinthians 16:1 – read the rest of the chapter to see Paul's gospel motivation for giving)*. Also consider King David as he encouraged the nation of Israel to support the building of the temple *(1 Chronicles 29:1-9)*. In both situations, the motive and encouragement for giving was always love for the Savior. It was always encouraged from a willing heart. It was repeatedly stressed that giving is a spiritual matter. For a gift or offering, then, to be dependent upon getting something in return; or for the giving to be motivated by a slick campaign or a feeling of duty ends up being a gimmick – and our Lord doesn't need gimmicks.

It is for these reasons that we have stayed away from freewill offerings at Lenten meals and refrain from having bake sales and bazaars to fund our ministry. Giving is a spiritual matter. It is one that God wants to come from the heart.

Now you know.

Central Africa Medical Mission - Lutheran Mobile Clinic (Malawi) April 2018

It is still the rainy season in Malawi with hit or miss afternoon showers most days. February and March had regular rains for crops but there was an unusually dry period in January, such that fields of maize (the staple crop here) failed to grow. Some people planted a second crop and we see some healthy maize fields which will soon be ready to harvest. It is the right amount of moisture at the right time which can determine whether Malawians go hungry next year or not. But where there is standing water, mosquitos thrive, and as they are the vector for malaria parasites getting into people's bloodstreams, malarial illness increases. In March the LMC staff have treated over 1200 patients who tested positive for malaria, with a total number of patients seen for all reasons totaling nearly 5,000.

As part of the Malawian Nursing Registration process, the nurse in charge must initially spend time in the government hospital working on various wards. As challenging as these shifts are, I am always reminded that the Lutheran Mobile Clinic is helping to keep children and adults out of the hospital. The primary health care we do is focused on prevention using screening, immunization, education and early treatment for things like malnutrition, diarrhea, and anemia, as well as malaria. Pregnant women and their babies are healthier due to being seen at our antenatal clinic, receiving insecticide treated mosquito nets, iron and folic acid, tetanus vaccine, screening for HIV, and malaria treatment as needed. The devastating consequences I have seen in the hospital of malaria- severe anemia from destruction of red blood cells, very low blood glucose, damage to the brain and other organs, and infections such as pneumonia, are less likely to happen due to the care our clinic provides in four different villages outside of Lilongwe.

Having been a part of CAMM in Malawi in the 1980's, and returning now, I am again familiar with the feeling that there is always something to trust God for. It may be the traffic and dangerous roads or it may be having a full staff each day we go to clinic. It could be having the needed medicines and test kits available for our work, or it might be having electricity available to keep our vaccines cold. It is certainly also trusting Him for the health and safety of loved ones in the US. We are always thankful for each day's end where we have seen answered prayers and abundant grace. Your prayers make a difference.

My husband Gary will be joining me this week to start his orientation to become the clinic administrator for the next 3 years. We intend to continue the good stewardship that the previous administrators have done with the very careful use of funds, thus managing to keep the budget balanced despite no longer having government help for our staff salaries. Your financial gifts are generous, timely and necessary. The pill bottles used for dispensing liquid medicine, sunscreen for albino children, cards and letters are much appreciated.

I am looking forward to worshipping at a the Easter service in Mwaleloumwe, one of the villages we serve. May the good news of Jesus continue to be spread both in Zambia and Malawi through our Lutheran pastors, medical clinics and those of you at home who sustain this gospel outreach.
